Shalom

This morning I heard the news that the Rev. Billy Graham had died at 99 years of age. It brought back memories of the times I had been a special counselor at rallies. In his lifetime he did much to bring about change by his willingness to meet with and pray with world leaders, spiritual and movement leaders such as Martin Luther King, and generations of U.S. Presidents. Today the conservative evangelical church has lost much of the thread of those early days and many seem to have forgotten the Gospel he preached - the one that calls us to be a catalyst for change and be the ones who welcome the broken-hearted and left out, who validate the stories of those harmed and work to bring about change to systems that hurt, harm and hold people down. One of his legacies was the practice of the altar call. The history of that goes back to Rev. Charles Finley who began that as a response against slavery – stand for the abolishment of slavery – people came forward to commit to Jesus and to sign a document committing to the abolition of slavery. The practice for Rev. Billy Graham was a powerful message – it is not enough to say you believe, it is not enough for faith to remain an intellectual activity – it needs to be a commitment of your whole self to Jesus, including putting your body on the line – all in!

We are in the season of Lent and then the season of Easter. The ministry of Jesus, the journey to the cross, the death and then resurrection should remind us that ours is an embodied, incarnational faith. It is not and never has been enough to say "I believe". Today we have many powerful witnesses to the need for an incarnational faith – one that says we are 'all in' to bring about change. Whether it is the "Me Too" movement which has begun the long process of validation of women's stories and changing the systemic devaluation of women and our culture of violence toward women, or "Silence is Not Spiritual" which seeks to change even the false narrative and interpretation of scripture we have built over generations that has justified even within the church treating women as less. Or the "Everytown USA" movement begun after the massacre at Sandy Hook, horror being relived right now at Parkland, Florida, a movement which includes mayors, communities and mothers who have said "Enough is Enough" and now the students who will not be ignored or silenced. Or "Black Lives Matter" or "LGBTQ Movement". Each of these movements and many more today, are comprised of people putting their whole selves on the line to bring about change. It is exactly what Jesus did here on earth.

Are all these people motivated by faith in Jesus Christ? Maybe not. But it is God's movement, acknowledged or not, to reclaim the dignity and preciousness of all of God's children. Jesus came to correct the narratives that were begun by those in power who claimed to speak for God, but spoke only for their own interests and power – who created God in their own image. It is what we are again a witness to today. Jesus today on earth would embody the change needed by non-violently confronting the false narratives that subjugate, devalue, harm, and even kill any person. He lived with those disciples -teaching, showing and empowering them to do all that he was doing. The stories were then given to us along with the Holy Spirit so that we too would put our whole selves into bringing about the upholding of the sacredness of all life and the equality and inclusion of everyone by God.

So where are you being called to go "all in"? Where are you, are we, being asked to do more than just saying "I believe"? The altar call was a metaphor for getting to our feet and committing with more than just words of assent, but with our whole selves to being an active part of the kingdom of God now. Jesus did not come to earth to just forgive sins or just to die on the cross. His life and death and resurrection are a call to an embodied faith that answers by saying, "Here I am Send Me" and then joining in to make a difference for all people.

So, where are you being called to go 'all in'?

From the Pulpit - March and April, 2018

March 4 - "Contemplate God's Glory" - Focus Text: Psalm 19

This week: It is so easy to just fire off an email or Facebook update or Twitter "tweet" or text message without thinking much about it. Challenge yourself to be more mindful of your words in these contexts this week. Take a deep breath before you respond to anything and make space in your heart before you start typing or texting. Notice how this mindfulness affects your sense of connection to others.



March 11 - God's Love is Steadfast - Focus Text: Psalm 107:1-3, 17-22

This week: Spend an entire day being thankful for everything that happens, no matter what happens.

Take a digital camera with you throughout your day, take pictures of moments of gratitude and post them to Facebook, Flickr, or your personal blog with your reflections on what it was like to be intentionally thankful throughout the day.

March 18 - "God's Love Is on Our Hearts" - Jeremiah 31:31-34

This week: What has God written on your heart? Make a list of what you hold most dear.

Cut out a heart shape on a piece of paper – it doesn't have to be very big. Write a favorite quote, a word of encouragement, something you love on it and find a public place to put it. Leave it at a coffee shop, post it on the bulletin board at work, put it in a book your loved one is reading for them to discover.

March 25 - "Love Arriving" - Mark 11:1-11

This week: What does it mean to come in someone else's name?

Think about the various responsibilities you have throughout the week; in whose name do you come in each of them? How might it change what you do or how you approach what you do if you understood yourself to be coming into each situation in the name of God?

Easter

Jesus sends the disciples out with the blessing, "Peace be with you." During Lent, we journeyed inward to find the laws of God written on our hearts. The Easter season is our time to move back out into the world, empowered by the Spirit we have encountered within.

Choose a project for yourself, your family, group or faith community that brings the peace of the risen Christ out into the world during this season.

April 1 – "Love Comes to Life" – Focus Texts: John 20:1–18; Mark 16:1–8

This week: In this year, we have two gospel stories of the Resurrection from which to choose. In John's gospel, Mary Magdalene has an encounter with the risen Christ. In Mark, the women see the empty tomb and are told by "a young man, dressed in a white robe" that they will see Jesus in Galilee. In John, Mary announces what she has seen; and in Mark, the women run away in fear.

Read both stories side by side and simply reflect on the differences. What is your own Easter experience like?

April 8 - "Love Is a Response to Grace" - John 20:19-31

This week: In this story, Jesus appears to the disciples when they are locked away in fear and breathes upon them with a word of peace and empowerment. Think of the last time someone calmed and empowered you. When have you done the same for someone else?

Make it your mission this week to look for occasions to breathe peace into a situation of fear.

April 15 - "Witness to Life Eternal" - Focus Text: Luke 24:36b-48 and I John 3:1-7

Here it is again – another story like last week from John's gospel (John 20:19–31) when Jesus encounters the disciples after the Resurrection and greets them with a word of peace. This encounter, however, doesn't seem to calm the disciples but stirs them up. When does being a Christ-like peace bearer stir things up?

Do some reading on the Internet about peace bearers like Martin Luther King, Jr. or organizations that protest against nuclear armament. Explore your own sense of call to being a peace bearer.

Jesus identifies himself in terms that people of his day and culture could understand – "I am the good shepherd." Being a good shepherd is linked to knowing the sheep and laying down one's life for the sheep.

Although this is a metaphor for Jesus caring for his followers, think about people in our current culture who work with and advocate for animals. How can you support their work?

April 29 - "Shepherd and Beloved of God" - Psalm 23, I John 3:16 and John 10:11-18

Jesus explains that God is like an expert gardener – an image well understood by the people who lived in Jesus' agrarian times. Today we can still identify with this imagery's meaning in our lives. We might already know that if we do not stay connected to the source of life we will not flourish. We will not bear fruit. The connection, to the source of life and community, is vital to our Christian faith. When we forget, how do we become reconnected?

Plant something new in your garden or on a windowsill and watch it grow. If you don't have a "green thumb," get a head start by planting something that's already flowering or producing fruit, such as a basil plant or flowering bush.

Shmita

The word in Hebrew literally means 'release', but is called the sabbatical year, the seventh year of the agricultural cycle mandated in the Torah in the Land of Israel, a time of Jubilee.

From the District Superintendent:

"Your pastor will be engaging in **Shmita: A Year of Learning, Reflection and Regeneration.** This is a required, intentionally designed process for clergy to participate in once every seven years. The clergy will be engaging in a 360 degree emotional intelligence leadership assessment, attending a 3 day retreat around healthy practices for well-being and effectiveness in ministry, be in a conversation group with two other clergy to reflect on healthy boundaries and resilience in ministry, and create a leadership development plan for the next chapter of their ministry.

There is biblical precedent for every seven years to be a jubilee year, where we take a Sabbath break, and let the ground go fallow so it can be renewed for the next season of harvest and growth. There is also a new requirement in the Book of Discipline that every clergy engage in assessment of their ministry every 8 years. We also have the expectation that clergy will renew their Boundary and Ethics training every five years. We are combining these requirements into what we are calling **Shmita**"

I am a part of the first 25 clergy who are participating in the roll out of our Conference's compliance with this new directive. The commitment is as follows

Retreat (25 clergy) - Completed January 22-24

<u>Workplace EQ 360</u> (LeaderWise) – areas of self-regard, self-actualization, emotional self-awareness, emotional expression, assertiveness, independence, interpersonal relationships, empathy, social responsibility, problem-solving, reality-testing, impulse control, flexibility, stress tolerance and optimism (survey done by self, manager [DS], peers, direct reports, family & friends)

<u>Teaching modules</u> – Managing Stress, Cultivating Resilience, Emotions: Friend or Foe, Psychological Principles for Making Changes Last, Courage in our Work and Boundaries
